Southwest Training Services, Inc. is proud to share that our Summer Youth Program Monitor, **Briana York,** performed in a choir tour in Italy this past summer.





Andrew Klepeis is a senior at Bentworth High School this year. He came in 1st Place in the Journalism Category at the recent FBLA Conference.


Andrew's future plans include attending University of Pittsburgh Main Campus for Political Science and Philosophy.

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SUCCEEDING IN AN INTERVIEW

- 1. Arrive for Your Interview About 15 Minutes in Advance: Make sure you take a trial run if you are unsure of the location or how long it might take to park. Punctuality is a major concern for employers of teens, and late arrival will often kill your chances of landing the job.
- 2. First Impressions Have a High Impact: Take care with the way you dress to show the employer that you are taking the job seriously. For most jobs, business casual will be suitable.
- 3. The Receptionist, Secretary or Another Staff Member Who Greets You May Not Be Your Interviewer: However, you can bet that the interviewer will ask about their impressions of you. Sit up straight, look them in the eye, smile and converse respectfully with them. Make them want to tell the boss that they like your personality and that you would fit in.
- 4. Greet the Interviewer With a Firm Handshake, a Warm Smile and Look Them in the Eye: Make a mental or physical note of their name and use it during the interview. Always address the interviewer as Mr. or Ms.
- 5. Turn Your Cell Phone off or to Vibrate: Resist the temptation to take a peek at any time before, during or after the meeting, when you are in view of the interviewer. Employers are very concerned about losing productivity among teen employees who are constantly checking their phones.
- 6. Exude Energy, Enthusiasm and a Positive Attitude at All Times: Employers want upbeat teen workers who don't bring any attitudinal baggage to the job. When sitting, avoid slouching and lean slightly forward, like you

are eager to hear the next thing that the interviewer has to say.

- 7. Take an Inventory of Your Strengths Prior to the Interview: If the employer has advertised the job, look at the description and be prepared to say how you meet as many of the qualifications as possible.
- 8. Be prepared to Say Why the Job Interests You.
- 9. At the End of the Interview, Be Prepared to Ask a Few Questions About the Job: Focus on issues like the type of the work, training, supervision and when you might expect to hear from them. Don't bring up pay. If the job seems like a good fit, look the interviewer in the eye and tell them that you would like to work there.
- 10. Effective Follow-Up After Your Interview Can Separate You From the Other Candidates: As soon as you leave the interview, compose a thank you note expressing your gratitude for the interview and stating briefly that you would love to work with them and why you think it's a good fit. A card is a nice touch if your handwriting is legible, but email is also acceptable. Whichever you choose, send it immediately. It will reinforce your punctuality and ability to get things done, as well as reiterating your interest in the job.

COMMUNITY CONNECTION: THE DREAMERS COMPANY & MR. AARON MILLER



The Dreamers Co. is a catalyst for community development in Washington. This nonprofit has addressed blight through the revitalization of homes, owned and rented, by elderly, disabled and veterans, as well as the beautification of public spaces, namely the park and playgrounds of Washington. Five years ago the company started with 62 volunteers and a few yards. Since then, over 80 properties have been revitalized and they have invested over 30,000 volunteer hours. Many of these hours come from high school students. From the beginning, The Dreamers Company has partnered young people with skilled trade persons from the community. This work has not only resulted

in measurable change, but many mentoring moments as well. "We believe that the strength of a community is the passing on of wisdom and passion from one generation to the next." states executive director, Aaron Miller.

One of the best expressions of The Dreamers Company, is the annual work week of Mission Washington, in June. During this week, over one hundred volunteers from across the community come together with a focused intensity to bring maximum change. The scope of work has varied from patching roofs, to pouring sidewalks, clearing abandoned lots, and landscaping yards.

One of the major concerns that the company continues to hear about are playgrounds. These spaces are essential to the memories and relationships that connect a community. The 7th Ward playground became a focal point of community conversation when it was closed due to vandalism and activities occurring late at night. With proper lighting and removal of line of sight obstructions for patrolling officers, rebuilding of benches and repairing equipment, this community space was refurbished.

The Dreamers Headquarters is well on its way! Recently the company took on their largest project to date and purchased a home for the burgeoning movement in the business district of the city. Once a home for the nuns who served at Immaculate Conception Church and JFK School, the convent located at 130 N Franklin St had sat empty for over a decade. Once renovations are complete, the 15,000+ square feet serve as an event space in the City of Washington. This space will be converted into a multifunctional community center and preeminent event

venue complete with a full kitchen, office and classroom space, an incubator for

emerging businesses, and a rooftop garden and patio.

of Cornerstone Care. Barbara was also a member of the Waynesburg Rotary Club.


She will always be fondly remembered for her commitment to workforce development and community service in Greene County and with Southwest Training Services, Inc.
